- **Regional Insights:** Articles between 800 - 1000 words providing a fresh take on regional studies. ([Writing Sample](#))

- **Research Frontline:** Articles between 1500 - 2000 words reflecting innovative regional research. ([Writing Sample](#))
- **Spotlight:** Articles between 2000 - 2500 words taking an in-depth look at critical issues for regional studies. ([Writing Sample](#))
- **Research Hacks:** Articles between 800 - 1000 words reflecting on academic experiences and practices. ([Writing Sample](#))

When submitting your contribution, kindly keep the following guidelines in mind:

- For all sections, case studies or practical examples are highly valued.
- Consider the audience and wider readership of the [Regions ezine](#), and where possible, avoid using excessive jargon and technical language.
- Please do not use footnotes; instead, use parenthesis for additional information.
- You may provide up to 6 pieces of supplementary material, such as pictures, tables, maps, infographics, videos etc. Please ensure that pictures and videos are of the highest resolution possible and include captions for all supplementary materials.
- Please send the supplementary materials separately to the email address for the written piece.
- Please ensure that copyright has not been infringed upon in using any material.
- Please provide a high-resolution portrait photo of yourself (optional) along with a 40-word biography that includes your name, position, institutional affiliation, and critical research interests.
- Please limit references to a maximum of six and place the bibliography at the end of the document. Any referencing style is accepted; however, please include direct access to the respective publication as a hyperlink.
